Fort Wayne, Indiana, “a most German town,” will be the site of the International German Genealogy Partnership (IGGP) 2023 Conference. Allen County Public Library Genealogy Center will be the local host for the conference which will be held on Friday, June 9 to Sunday, June 11.

The conference will be held at the Grand Wayne Convention Center in downtown Fort Wayne. The three-day conference will be filled with presentations and activities tailored to the German genealogist. International in scope the IGGP Conference focuses on the history and genealogy of those with German Ancestry.

A Partnership Leadership Day will be held on June 8, 2023.

Three hotels have been designated as conference hotels—Courtyard, Hampton Inn, and Hilton. The Hilton is adjacent to the Grand Wayne Convention Center. 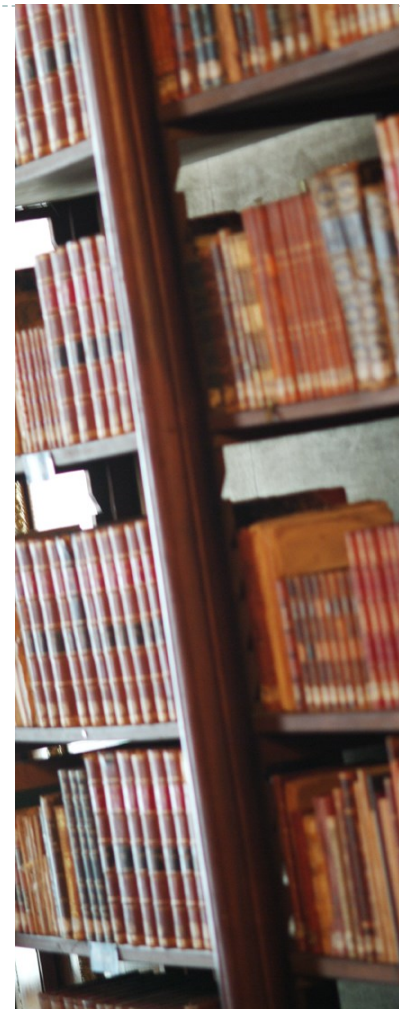
While in Fort Wayne be sure to visit the Allen County Genealogy Center. It is just steps away from the conference venue.
